Collectively, these elements form a comprehensive platform that empowers artistic expression, strengthens cultural ties, and amplifies the diverse voices that define the region's creative landscape.

This year's MFAFP exhibition, themed "Collective Motion," embodies the shared rhythm that arises when people, systems, and ideas move and create in harmony. In an era defined by interconnection and constant change, Collective Motion explores how unity and diversity coexist, how distinct voices and forces converge to generate collective energy and progress. The theme mirrors ASEAN's vision of a people-centred, forward-moving community, where nations of different backgrounds and identities advance together under one shared purpose.

Held in collaboration with Kakiseni, Malaysia's leading arts platform, MFAFP 2025 continues to champion creative exchange across painting, performance, installation, and digital media. Launched in 2023, the Maybank Foundation Artist Fellowship Programme (MFAFP) nurtures emerging artists across ASEAN by providing them a platform to create, collaborate, and lead positive change through the arts.

Driven by Maybank Foundation's commitment to community empowerment and cultural preservation, the programme unites artists from diverse backgrounds in a regional residency that fosters exchange of ideas, techniques, and stories.

More than an art programme, MFAFP is a movement that builds an ecosystem where creativity meets purpose, and where art becomes a catalyst for social impact, inclusion, and sustainability. Through workshops, mentorships, and exhibitions, the fellowship strengthens ASEAN's cultural identity while empowering artists to envision a more connected and compassionate future.

MFAFP 2025: Collective Motion

In an era defined by interconnection and constant movement, Collective Motion explores how people, systems, and forces come together, moving, thinking, and creating as one.

From the flocking of birds to digital networks and cultural movements, motion emerges when individual parts act in harmony. This theme invites artists to reflect on that shared rhythm, exploring how unity and diversity coexist and how collective behaviour shapes identity, innovation, and progress.

Anchored under MFAFP 2025, Collective Motion resonates with ASEAN's vision of a people-centred and forward-moving community under ASEAN 2025: Forging Ahead Together. As Malaysia assumes the ASEAN Chairmanship, this year's edition aligns with the region's call for collaboration, cultural cohesion, and shared prosperity.

The key visual embodies this idea through a flow of converging strokes that suggest energy, harmony, and transformation. Each strand retains its own trajectory, yet together they form a dynamic silhouette that mirrors how distinct voices unite to create shared momentum. It serves as a visual metaphor for the exhibition's exploration of connection, rhythm, and purpose.

Held in collaboration with Kakiseni, Malaysia's leading arts platform, MFAFP 2025 continues to champion creative exchange through painting, performance, installation, and digital media. Participating artists from across ASEAN interpret the many forms of movement found in nature, society, and technology, revealing synchronised systems, creative disruptions, and new patterns of unity.

In nurturing these voices, Maybank Foundation, together with Kakiseni, continues its mission to empower ASEAN's creative leaders by using art to inspire dialogue, preserve heritage, and spark meaningful change.

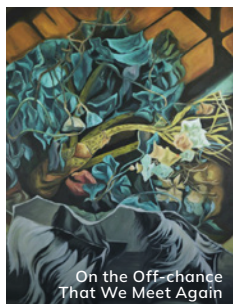
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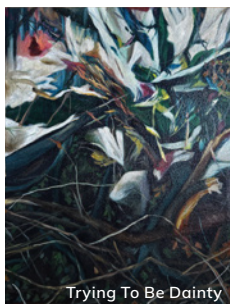

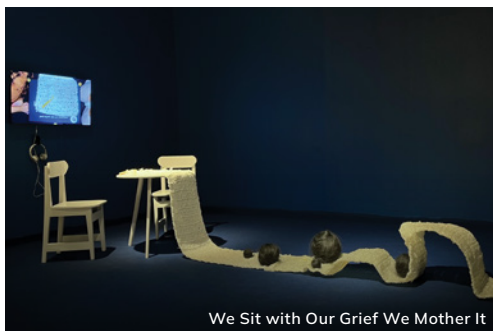
